Internal characteristics

• Issue identification and vision Assessment of issues, trends, needs, and opportunities. Vision of what the community wants to be.

Goals

Reflections of public values and desired conditions.

Fact base

Analysis of current and future conditions and explanation of reasoning. Maps and tables that enhance relevance and comprehensibility.

Policies

Specification of principles to guide public and private decisions.
Sufficiently specific to be tied to definite actions.

Implementation

Commitments to carry out policy-driven actions with timelines, responsible parties, and financing.

Monitoring and evaluation

Measurable objectives and trackable indicators. Assignments made for monitoring.

Internal consistency

Issues, vision, goals, policies, and implementation are mutually reinforcing.

External characteristics

Organization and presentation Plan is understandable for a wide range of readers. Executive summary; glossary; cross-referencing of issues,

glossary; cross-referencing of issues, goals, and policies; clear maps, charts, and images; supporting video, CD, web page.

Interorganizational coordination

Integration with other plans of public and private parties. Vertical and horizontal coordination.

Compliance

Consistent with plan mandates from enabling legislation, other.
